

# INFORMATION ABOUT VOLUNTEERING

## What is volunteering?

Volunteer Australia has defined formal volunteering as an activity which takes place through not-for-profit community organisations and is considered to be;

- Of benefit to both the community and the volunteer
- Of the volunteer's own free will
- For no financial payment
- In a position not designated as paid
- In accordance with the 'Principles of Volunteering'

## Principles of Volunteering

The Principles of Volunteering are a set of guidelines developed to protect volunteers.

Volunteering:

- Benefits the community and the volunteer
- Is always a matter of choice
- Is unpaid and not undertaken for the receipt of salary, pension or government allowance
- Is a legitimate way to address human, environmental and social needs in your community
- Is an activity performed in the not for profit sector only
- Volunteers do not replace paid workers nor are they a threat to the job security of paid workers
- Respects the rights, dignity and culture of others
- Promotes human rights and equality

## Why do people volunteer?

- To make a difference in their community
- Learn more and maintain an active involvement in their community
- Gain personal satisfaction from helping others
- Build social networks and to meet new people/make friends
- Improve communication skills & build self confidence
- Enjoyment and fun
- Learn new skills
- Gain work experience employment

## As someone who wants to volunteer, what should you consider?



When thinking about becoming a volunteer, you should ask yourself these questions:

- Why do I want to volunteer?
- How much time do I have?
- What length of time can I commit to?
- What are my interests?
- What are my skills, both professionally and socially?

## Process to becoming a volunteer

- Inquiry – role description
- Application form
- Interview/informal chat
- Referee Check
- Police Check & Working With Children Check if appropriate
- Induction/Orientation
- Training

# Volunteer rights and responsibilities

Unlike paid staff, volunteers are not covered by awards or workplace agreements. Volunteers however do have rights, some of which are included in legislation and others could be considered the moral obligations of an organisation involving volunteers.

Volunteers also have responsibilities, which are the obligations of the volunteer.

## Volunteer rights

As a volunteer you have a right to:

- Have a volunteer position description with agreed volunteering hours
- Be given information about the organisation and an orientation
- Be supported and supervised in your volunteering role
- Be given a volunteer policy and other policies that affect your volunteering
- Be recognised as a valued team member
- Be made aware of the grievance procedure within the organisation
- Adequate insurance cover
- A safe & healthy work environment
- Reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses
- Freedom of choice (i.e. the right to say 'no')

## Volunteer responsibilities

All volunteers are expected to:

- Carry out the duties listed in your volunteer position description
- Be punctual and reliable
- Respect the rights and privacy of others
- Be prepared to follow the organisation's volunteer policies and procedures
- Be committed to the organisation and accountable for the volunteer work that you do
- Undertake training as requested
- Value and support other team members and ask for support when needed
- Give advance notice in regards to changes in your availability or before leaving the organisation

You can search for them in a variety of ways. This may include online, enquiring through your local council or speaking directly with a volunteer resource centre such as Volunteer West that can link you to volunteer work or have volunteer roles available.

You can use a volunteer matching website to search for opportunities by topic, interest, location, organisation or availability. Alternatively, many volunteer organisations also advertise positions on their websites.
